
Prayer Changes Us

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From the Earth Ministry: Recycling of Christmas Lights

As the holiday season concludes, attention turns to undecorating our homes. As you put away your decorations and check your strings of lights, you might find that some lights no longer work. Strings of lights cannot be recycled in the usual manner, as they cause entangling in the recycling machines. However, the Milwaukee Zoo will accept and recycle strings of lights through December 31. Lights can be put in the big yellow box in the Gathering Place. Alternatively, lights can be left with the gate attendants if you are not planning to spend the day at the Zoo. The large hardware stores in town are not accepting strings of lights this year. Thank you for all of your recycling efforts.

Everyday Missionary Stories

Capuchin priests were the associate pastors of the grade school and church I went to growing up on the northwest side of Milwaukee. Several of those priests would distinctly say at the end of the mass petitions... " and let us pray for those who will die alone and forgotten." I always thought that was such a profound and shocking statement. Always thinking "Who would die alone and forgotten? How could that happen?" I belong to a large family and people are never forgotten and never really alone (never spiritually and most of the time never physically alone) at the time of death.

Today I was on a zoom call at work to assist with a difficult case situation and got to see a work peer that I haven't seen in over 17 years. He is a corporate guardian, mostly for adults with developmental disabilities, and a super dedicated professional. When I was case managing in the community, he was guardian for several of my clients.

Seeing him today reminded me of a shared client that we worked with. This person had been abandoned by his family. He had only one friend, who ended up being his paid caregiver. He had met that friend during the days when he was living on the street and in flop houses. When this shared client of ours died, we both went to his funeral. The guardian, the caregiver and I were the only ones at his funeral. We were asked by the funeral home to go out to the cemetery and be pall bearers for him. I was honored to do so but I remember thinking that we were all "paid" people in his life.

That moment gave me some perspective of someone who those Capuchin priests were asking us to pray for.

In this time of hustle and bustle of the holidays, let us not forget that the greatest gift you can give someone is being present in their life and letting them know you are there for them in some capacity without it being conditional.

Emmaus 90 – 2025

Emmaus 90 is a 90-day journey from New Year's to Easter 2025 that brings you closer to Jesus Christ through prayer and formation. It's a personal commitment to grow in holiness with the support of hundreds of fellow participants (pilgrims) and the leadership of nationally-recognized educators.

One of the features of Emmaus 90 are the formation sessions. This year we will again offer monthly formation sessions after the 9:00AM Mass at St. Therese Parish on the second Sunday of the month and will last about 30 minutes. **The first session will be on Sunday, January 12**. What a great way to start the new year with a deeper commitment grow in holiness and knowledge of the faith.

St. Elizabeth Ann Seton | January 4th

The patron saint of Catholic schools, St. Elizabeth Ann Seton (August 28, 1774 – January 4, 1821) was born in New York City to a prominent family of the Episcopal faith. When she turned 19, she married a wealthy businessman with whom she had five children. He later died of tuberculosis in 1803, leaving her a young widow. After discovering the Catholic faith in Italy, where her husband had died, she returned to New York and converted to Catholicism in 1805.



After several years struggling as a single mother, Elizabeth moved in 1809 to

Emmitsburg, Maryland, where she founded the Sisters of Charity of St. Joseph, the first community for religious women established in the United States. She also began St. Joseph's Academy and Free School, which started a chain reaction of Catholic-based education in the United States that continues today.

St. Elizabeth Ann Seton was canonized September 14, 1975 in St. Peter's Square by Pope Paul VI and was the first citizen born in the United States to be given the title of "saint."©LPi

St. John Neumann | January 5th

St. John Neumann is the patron saint of educators, immigrants, and, due to the miracles that secured his canonization, sick children. This is a fitting patronage as he was a lover of education and learning from a very young age. In fact, when



he was a child, his mother called him "my little bibliomaniac" due to his preoccupation with reading. Born in 1811 Bohemia, in what is now the Czech Republic, he attended the university in Prague preparing for ordination. However, his local bishops were not ordaining new priests at the time because Bohemia was overstocked with priests. He inquired about ordination all over Europe but received the same answer everywhere. Not one to be deterred, John then applied to several United States dioceses. Receiving no immediate responses, the saint took a leap of faith and decided to just immigrate to the United States in 1836, during his 25th year, with only \$40 in his pocket. This risk paid off when he was ordained in New York a month later.

Early in his priesthood he worked primarily as a missionary to German immigrants in Buffalo. His missionary work also created an opportunity for him to spend time in Maryland, Virginia, Michigan, and Ohio. When he was 29, he joined the Congregation of the Most Holy Redeemer (Redemptorists), a congregation of priests and brothers dedicated to helping the poor and most abandoned. He was their first member to profess vows in the United States.

In 1852, at the age of 41, Neumann became the fourth Bishop of Philadelphia. During this time, he organized the individual parochial schools in his region into a diocesan system. This change allowed Catholic schools to quickly increase the number of pupils enrolled by almost twentyfold. Over the course of his ministry, St. John expanded the number of Catholic schools in his diocese from 2 to 100! His passion for education extended to immigrants, like himself, and his love for learning languages made it possible for him to hear confessions in English, Spanish, French, Italian, Dutch, and Gaelic!

A man of the people, he could often be found outside the church walls visiting people who were sick, staying in taverns and public houses to teach, and celebrating Mass in people's homes at their kitchen tables. He was canonized on June 19, 1977, following three miracles, two of which regarded the healing of youth from grave illnesses. St. John Neumann was the first American man to be canonized a saint.
